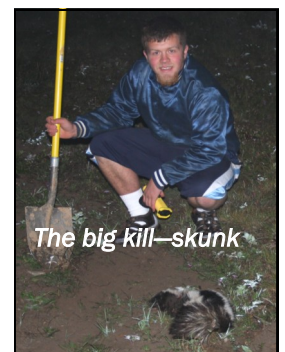
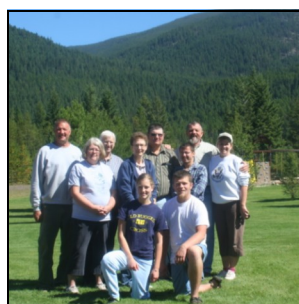
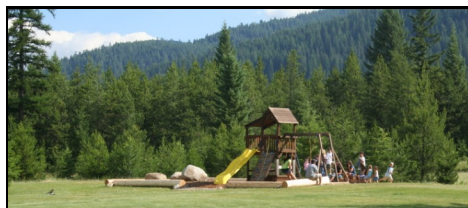
*Rejoice in the Lord always. Again I will say, rejoice!

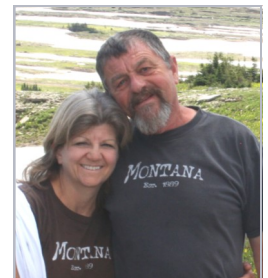

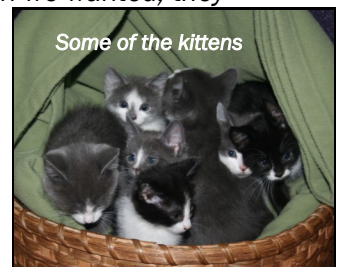
Janet has been busy making baskets and looks to having more ministry in this area. She has appreciated Abbie's help in the kitchen.
